TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

As soon as Christmas ends, people begin planning for Easter! Originally, the source of our Paschal Triduum was but a single liturgy extending from Saturday sundown to sunrise on Easter Sunday. The two days leading up to the liturgy were days of fast, not only for the elect, but for the church preparing to baptize them. A fifth-century pope explained that the church imitated the apostles, who were in hiding with their grief from the arrest of Jesus, and therefore sacraments, even penance, were forbidden.

Inevitably, though, people wanted to come together, and so eventually a Liturgy of the Word developed for Good Friday. This was the first step toward today's shape of the Triduum, and gradually new ideas were embraced, including the veneration of the cross and a simple Communion service. Interestingly, the Word remained central, since we know that in those days the pope did not receive Communion at this liturgy, even though the faithful had that option. In the other churches of Rome, priests and people received Communion under both species. Although the custom of Communion on Good Friday took hold, it did not endure past the Middle Ages. The central liturgies of the year slowly unraveled and disappeared from parish life. Remember that there were no seminaries in those days, and books were a rare luxury. Most priests could only manage to celebrate a simple "low" Mass, and few parishes could afford the ritual books that would guide a priest through the complex forms. Holy Week remained important in private devotion, but for a time the liturgies virtually disappeared.

It takes a Parish

The St. Julie's community Events Ministry presented a World of Nativities for the third year. The purpose of the display is to remind people of the true meaning of Christmas. We welcomed 1,325 guests during the 16 days the display was open.

On display, at the Thousand Oaks community Gallery by the library, were four collections totaling 321 nativities from 61 countries. About 199 children completed the scavenger hunt and found the country of origin of nativities made of specific materials like foil paper, straw, wire and horse hair.

Adults reminisced about their childhood Christmases and refocused on the true meaning of Christmas. They wrote comments such as "Stupendous, amazing, thanks", "Super wonderful!". We knew the nativities worked their miracle when visitors wrote comments like. . . "Amazing, please continue showing the reason for the season - Jesus!" and "What a blessing to see!" "Awesome, inspiring."

We want to thank the 25 parishioners and 11 members of the Thousand Oaks Woman's club that volunteered to welcome guests, set up and clean up.

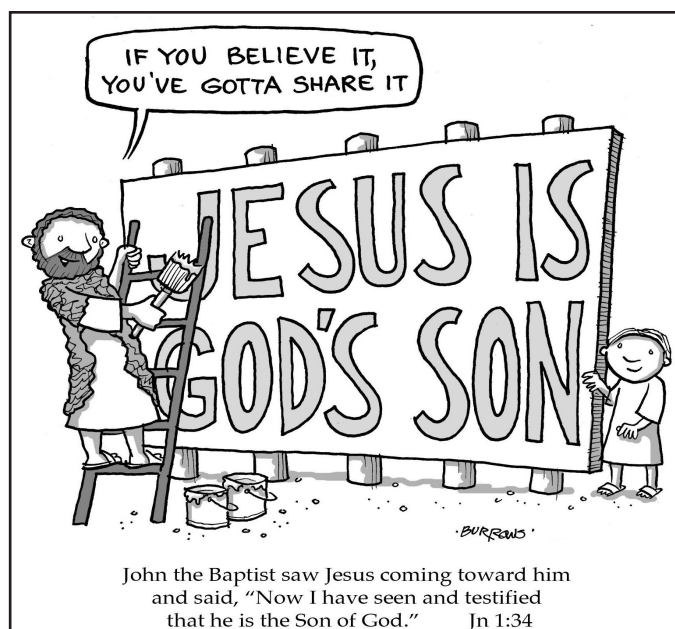

Mass Appeal: The Art of Corita Kent JANUARY 27 - APRIL 3, 2017

About the Exhibition:

Corita Kent (1918-1986) was an artist, educator and advocate for social justice. At the age of 18 she entered the religious order at Immaculate Heart of Mary, where she became the head of the art department at Immaculate Heart College. Throughout the 1960's, her work became increasingly political, urging viewers to consider poverty, racism and injustice. In 1968, she left the Order and moved to Boston. At the time of her death she had created almost 800 serigraphs, watercolors and public and private commissions.

Corita Kent's slogan are an integral part of her art and are meant to inspire and invigorate against the onslaught of mass communication, Her artwork still possesses the universal appeal of hope during challenging times. this exhibit focuses on the political poster, her successful "Love" prints and her spiritual message about rejoicing in the everyday. The exhibition represents her core message of using art as a healing salve and as an agent for social action.

DID YOU KNOW - Help children communicate by reading between the lines. When children express that something is wrong at school or with other activities, it's often the job of caregivers to read between the lines to determine what's really going on. They might say "I'm bored" and need your guidance finding a better school-life balance or engaging in more challenging academic work. Ask them to give examples and to help you understand what is going on. If the child is still being vague, remind them that they can tell you anything and that you'll listen with an open mind. As parents and caregivers, you have the opportunity to help kids deal well with negative feelings and challenges. And, if they are being mistreated in some way, keeping an open line of communication with kids will enable you to be their advocate.
